

Father & Son Beanies by Woolly Wormhead



Yarn

147yd/134m/100g
Aran weight, multi-ply yarn.

Needles & Notions

Set 4.5mm/UK7/US7 DPNs/Circular or size needed to obtain gauge
Stitch marker as necessary
Tapestry needle

Sample details

Babylonglegs Handspun 3ply
[147yd/134m per 100g; 100% Wool]

Gauge

18 sts x 24 rows to 10cm/4" on 4.5mm needles over St.St
17 sts x 32 rows to 10cm/4" on 4.5mm needles over Garter St.
17 sts x 24 rows to 10cm/4" on 4.5mm needles over Twisted Rib
17 sts x 23 rows to 10cm/4" on 4.5mm needles over Moss/Seed St.

Sizes

To fit sizes: 18 [20, 22, 24] in/45.74 [50.75, 55.75, 61] cm
Finished size: 15 [17, 18.75, 20.75] in/38 [43.25, 47.5, 52.75] cm

Skills required

Knit & purl sts, knitting in the round, increases & decreases,

Abbreviations

K:	knit
P:	purl
RS:	right side
WS:	wrong side
Rnd/rnd:	round
rpt:	repeat
st(s):	stitch(es)
K1tbl:	knit next stitch through the back of the loop
ssk:	slip next 2 sts knit wise then knit them together
k2tog:	knit next 2 sts together

How to

Using the most suitable cast-on method for your choice of body stitch, cast on 64 [72, 80, 88] sts

Join in the rnd, being careful not to twist sts.
Place stitch marker to indicate start of rnd.

Body option A - Garter welt

Starting with a purl round, work alternate rounds of knit and purl (creating garter stitch in the round) until work measures 3.75 [4.25, 4.75, 5.25] in/ 9.5 [10.75, 12, 13.25] cm (or desired length), ending after a knit round.

Body option B - Twisted Rib welt

Next rnd: *K1tbl, P1; rpt from * to end

Repeat this round until work measures 3.75 [4.25, 4.75, 5.25] in/ 9.5 [10.75, 12, 13.25] cm (or desired length)

Work next round plain (knit all sts)

Body option C - Moss/Seed Stitch welt

(not shown)

Rnd 1: *K1, P1; rpt from * to end

Rnd 2: *P1, K1; rpt from * to end

Repeat these rounds until work measures 3.75 [4.25, 4.75, 5.25] in/9.5 [10.75, 12, 13.25] cm (or desired length)

Work next round plain (knit all sts)

Crown

15in size jump to Rnd 7, 17in size jump to Rnd 5, 18.75in size jump to Rnd 3 and 20.75in size start at Rnd 1

Rnd 1: *K9, k2tog, ssk, K9; rpt from * to end [80 sts]

Rnd 2: Knit all sts

Rnd 3: *K8, k2tog, ssk, K8; rpt from * to end [72 sts]

Rnd 4: Knit all sts

Rnd 5: *K7, k2tog, ssk, K7; rpt from * to end [64 sts]

Rnd 6: Knit all sts

Rnd 7: *K6, k2tog, ssk, K6; rpt from * to end [56 sts]

Rnd 8: Knit all sts

Rnd 9: *K5, k2tog, ssk, K5; rpt from * to end [48 sts]

Rnd 10: Knit all sts

Rnd 11: *K4, k2tog, ssk, K4; rpt from * to end [40 sts]

Rnd 12: Knit all sts

Rnd 13: *K3, k2tog, ssk, K3; rpt from * to end [32 sts]

Rnd 14: Knit all sts

Rnd 15: *K2, k2tog, ssk, K2; rpt from * to end [24 sts]

Rnd 16: Knit all sts

Rnd 17: *K1, k2tog, ssk, K1; rpt from * to end [16 sts]

Rnd 18: Knit all sts

Rnd 19: *k2tog, ssk; rpt from * to end [8 sts]

Break yarn and draw through remaining 8sts, tighten to close.

Finishing

Weave in all ends. Blocking isn't necessary but should you wish, only a gentle wash is needed to help the decrease lines settle in. Try to avoid over stretching the body – you want the Hat to stretch comfortably and be snug when worn.


